There's a story that on the Sunday after Easter, a Sunday School teacher gave each child in the class a small box. The children were instructed to go outside and find symbols of new life and put them in their box. Once dismissed they ran wildly throughout the property looking for something to fill their boxes. After several minutes the kids returned to the classroom and began sharing what they found. One by one they opened their boxes to show flowers, butterflies, leaves and more. Each time the class would "ooh" and "ahh". Then they got to a little boy who wasn't well liked by the other students. When he opened his box it showed that there was nothing in it. The other kids began to laugh and say things like "That's stupid! He didn't do it right!" That's when the little boy exclaimed, "I did to! It's empty...because the tomb where Jesus laid was found empty!"

That little boy understood that there was no greater symbol of new life than Jesus's empty tomb. It is through the resurrection of Jesus that we all have been given a new life.

1 Peter 1:3-5 reads: ³ Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, ⁴ and into an inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade. This inheritance is kept in heaven for you, ⁵ who through faith are shielded by God's power until the coming of the salvation that is ready to be revealed in the last time.

Even though Easter is over...the plastic eggs have been put away...stores have put Easter candy on clearance...the snow has melted...we know the celebration is never over. As Christians we rejoice daily that our Savior is alive and that we have new life guaranteed through His blood and resurrection. We are not dead to sin but alive in Christ!

So as we gather around this table for communion, we can thank our Lord for the beauty of His creation and for flowers, and leaves, and butterflies. But let us really thank Him for an empty box!
