Sunday Worship Service Bible School As Dave noted when sending me the total offerings that had come in for April 26th, "Not a typo." The \$39,059.16 in the statistics column is for real! Sort of.

The regular offerings that had been sent to the church for the month totaled just under \$20,000, which is about \$500 a week under our pre-quarantine projection. What shot the number soaring was a \$36,000 gift that had been sent for missions. The donor had taken funds out of his retirement account, and asked that we use them to meet special needs that exist in the missions we support. After evaluating the needs we were aware of, three were selected.

\$17,000 was sent to Theo to purchase a vehicle. His truck was almost beyond repairs, and he has had to rely on public transportation and taxis to minister to the churches he oversees and to meet the various needs that exist. The churches in Jamaica are very dependent on support from others, and we have always been Theo's primary supporter. We bought him his first vehicle nearly 30 years ago, and he managed to replace it once, but due to a decline in support and expanding needs was unable to purchase another.

The second recipient was Haitian Christian Ministries. Mark Zimmerman is on their board, and after consulting with him we decided to send the school \$10,000 to help with a much needed bathroom and septic system. Mark said it was desperately needed, but was not something that's easy to get supporters excited about.

The final gift went to Kent Paris. As you know, Kent is one of very few who offers biblical hope and healing to those who are caught up in sinful sexual confusion. He has recently had overwhelming health and financial struggles, and has even been banned from using Facebook for posting content that was deemed hateful. The \$5,000 we were able to send not only met pressing needs, but was a great encouragement to him and Sherri.

The remaining \$4,000 is being held for anticipated needs that may be soon coming from Mexico or elsewhere.

COVID-19 AND HAITI

COVID-19 seems to be the topic of discussion for so many of us right now. It has changed the way the entire world is doing business and had dramatically changed the daily lives of everyone. The numbers are very limited in Haiti at this moment, but the fear is tangible, especially due to the structural weaknesses the country has been subject to for years.

As a minister, I bear witness to the fact that people who were already living in suffering, are suffering even more. A large majority of people still need to go out every day to earn their daily bread. The government, now asking this majority to stay home to avoid spreading the virus, exposes them to another challenge, that of finding food. I am pretty sure that some people may not only die from coronavirus, but from hunger. And more tuberculosis cases may also arise as a result afterward.

As with many of you, we in Haiti miss our people and church services. We could offer online services like other churches do, but only a very small percentage of those in our community have access to electricity or the internet and our churches are not online every day.

While the northern side of Haiti still does not have any reported cases of the coronavirus, our people have benefited from visits with families every Sunday morning outside in their yards. We maintain a 6-foot distance as we pray, minister, sing and teach. We encourage them with God's words, teach them how to protect themselves against the virus, pray with them and share what we have.

Our employees have been blessed and are very grateful for receiving their monthly salary early to help them provide for their families by going out and purchasing food to be able to stay home and help combat the spread of the virus. As the pastors become aware of a need for food they let me know and we make arrangements for the pastors to receive some food to take to those in need. As supporters of HCM you have provided the food through your monthly donations.

I thank you for that.

First of all, THANK YOU for your help with Asian Christian Mission. And, of course, your continued help. But to answer your question about special needs, Jesse's medical bills are paid.

The desire of his heart was to take Christ to the Jerwang people. It was the culture of his father and he wanted to continue a more intense work with them. His normal expenses will continue through the rest of the year as he had originally planned to retire at the end of this year due to age and health. But, as you know, he passed away in March. His wife, Ati, who was very dedicated to him and his work, then his care, will be working with the evangelists going to the Jerwang people. Every other month I forward by "wire" the operating funds and I will do so again in early May. This consists of a salary for Jesse, (now, Ati), expenses incurred still working with the Lisu, expenses for visits to the Jerwang villages and materials for them, and expenses incurred for Thailand evangelism. The bulk of the expenses of the Jerwang Bible translation is being picked up by another organization.

However, since Jesse's death, support has fallen some. We will try to make it to the end of the year. That is why your continue support is appreciated.

If you are aware of another mission who has a pressing need, under these circumstances, I believe Jesse would suggest you remember them.
