# Christmas Fast, Fresent, and Future

Charles Dickens wrote 'A Christmas Carol' back in 1843--which is now a popular TV movie during the Christmas season. Today as we meet around this communion table, I'd like to borrow from that movie the three themes of Christmas Past, Christmas Present, and Christmas Yet to Come--and talk about special gifts for us from God.

We remember the story of the first Christmas--of how Mary and Joseph traveled to Bethlehem, how there was no room for them at the inn, how Mary gave birth to Jesus and wrapped him in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger. And then how angels appeared to shepherds and told them that a Savior had been born.

As beautiful as this story is, there is one thing that prevails throughout this very first Christmas --Jesus was born to die. His whole purpose for being born was the cross--to die to pay the penalty for our sins. Matthew 20:28 The Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many. It was Christmas Past when God gave that tiny gift of redemption to the world.

We now move into Christmas Present which takes us to this communion table. This weekly observance is not to keep a dead memory alive. We serve a risen Savior who has conquered death and the grave. More importantly, Jesus has conquered sin--sin no longer has dominion over us. We have been given a brand new life in Christ. Romans 6:23 For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Lastly, we come to Christmas Yet to Come—where we anticipate Jesus' second coming to earth to gather the faithful. *I Cor. 11:26 For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until He comes.* When that day arrives, we will receive another special gift from God--an invitation to attend the Marriage Feast of the Lamb in heaven. Can you imagine the incredible family celebration that will be? And then gifts from God will just keep on coming for eternity! *Romans 8:18 In my opinion whatever we may have to go through now is less than nothing compared with the magnificent future God has planned for us.* 

Close to the end of the movie, Ebenezer Scrooge sums it all up by giving us the moral of the story: "I will honor Christmas in my heart, and try to keep it all the year. I will live in the Past, the Present, and the Future... I will not shut out the lessons that they teach!" Although Ebenezer was referring to the three Christmas spirits that had visited him, may we try to keep all year long --the true story of Christmas Past, Christmas Present and Christmas Yet to Come---of how Jesus went from the stable to the table--and how he is now preparing for us a future too glorious to even try to describe.
