We have turned husbands and wives into androgynous 'spouses,' fathers and mothers into interchangeable 'parent figures.' We approach having a child like acquiring a pool table or widescreen TV. Would it be fun? Would it be tedious? Would it be worth the expense? Fathers and mothers have need of recovering their sense of regal calling, taking up their ball and scepter, and ruling their dominions with love for their precious subjects.

"May it be needless to say that mothers and fathers must also recover the conviction of their need for each other. They must do this not only for their own sakes, but also for their young. Every child needs both kinds of love. It is not enough to provide an intermediate love that is half motherly and half fatherly. Or an inconsistent love that is motherly at some times, fatherly at others. Even though the two loves resemble each other, they are distinct, and neither can be imitated by anything else. Yes, it may be true heroism when, through no fault of one's own, a father or a mother raises a child all alone; yet it is better to not be alone. No woman can fully take the place of a father, any more than a man can substitute for a mother."

We finally made contact last Saturday, and things are going fairly well in spite of curfews that were in place for several weeks on weekends and evenings. Churches and even Bible studies couldn't meet, but Theo was able to go online with the service from Ocho, and Bible studies went to a Zoom style format. The worship service was very well received, with many viewing who never went to church, and some watching from the states and UK as well.

As here, online services are a two-edged sword. It is good to be able to share a service online, but some get too comfortable just watching. The churches were recently given permission to meet again with a limit of thirty, but many have been slow to return. To encourage people to actually come to church, Theo decided to stop broadcasting the service and just make recordings available to members who are actually unable to come.

Churches in Jamaica raise a considerable amount of their budget through annual Harvest Celebrations where church members and friends bring baked goods, food items, and crafts to be purchased. One is scheduled for Claremont this Sunday, and even though some can actually come, Theo is asking that baked good not be brought because people tend to flock around such items.
