When we got to the church we held a prayer meeting, and I'll never forget the prayer of Jerry Aulich. "Praise God, Bless His People. Fill this Church, and Deliver the Steeple."

The steeple arrived, and on Saturday while the men were hoisting it in place, the women were moving furniture, arranging rooms, and putting books on my still sagging shelves.

Hopefully everything will ready to go for the dedication of our gym, and the first church volleyball game of the season, on the 15th.

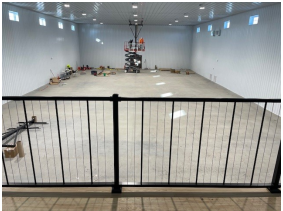
GYMNASIUM

A VALENTINE'S DAY COMMUNION MEDITATION

As you know, on Sunday nights we have been watching Ray Vander Laan's series *That the World May Know*. A handful of weeks ago Ray explained the betrothal and wedding practices in the Jewish culture. Rick has recently also explained the process in his sermons, specifically explaining Mary and Joseph's relationship. Well, you are going to hear it again this morning from me.

In Jewish culture, a wedding didn't begin at the altar, it began with a betrothal. This was far more than a promise or engagement. It was a binding covenant between the groom and bride's father, then ultimately the bride. When a young man desired a bride, he would go to her father's home and negotiate a bride price, called the *mohar*. This wasn't a purchase in a cold sense, it was a declaration of value. It said, "Your daughter is precious to me and I want to bring her into my family. I am willing to give something costly for her." Only when the price was agreed upon would the covenant move forward. A cup of wine was poured and the groom would offer it to the potential bride. If she drank from the cup, she was saying yes, yes to the covenant, yes to the future, yes to belonging to him. The couple was then considered to be betrothed. They were considered husband and wife, they just didn't live together yet. That's because after the cup was shared, the groom would leave to prepare a place for her. He would return to his father's house and begin building an addition onto it, called the insula, a dwelling place where they would one day live together. And the groom was eager to get the room complete so he could bring his bride home and partake in husbandry things. But it was the father who decided the room was complete. The father told the son when to go get his bride and bring her home.

During the betrothal period, the bride lived in expectation. She kept herself ready because she didn't know when her bridegroom was returning. She remembered the covenant and she trusted the promise of the one who would return for her. Jesus referenced this imagery when He said, "My Father's house has many rooms; if that were not so, would I have told you that I am going there to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am. You know the way to the place where I am going." Jesus is building the insula for His bride. He is preparing the dwelling. And one day, the Father will say, "It is time," and the Son will come for His bride. He will come for us!

Communion reminds us of the covenant we have entered into with Jesus. On the night Jesus was betrayed, He lifted a cup and said, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which is poured out for you." He was offering a covenant to His bride, the Church. And the price He paid was not silver or gold, but His own life. Jesus's life was our bride price. When we take the bread and the cup, we remember the price that was paid. We remember the covenant that was sealed. We remember that we are not abandoned, we are betrothed. We belong to a faithful Bridegroom who is even now preparing a place for us. The bread reminds us of His body given for us. The cup reminds us of His blood poured out for us. And together they remind us: we are loved, chosen, and promised a future with Him. As you receive communion today, let your heart res pond like that bride who lifted the cup and said yes. Say yes again to His covenant. Yes to His love. Yes to living ready for His return. Our Bridegroom has paid the price. He is preparing the place. And He will come again.
